Justice, Future Generations and the Environment

FEBRUARY 7, 2024, 8h30 - 17h00 Constitutional Council, Paris, France

The concept of Future Generations is increasingly being mobilized in litigation before national, regional and international courts. Encompassing broader transgenerational challenges – bioethics, genetic and cultural heritage, sovereign debt – the notion is primarily focused on climate and environmental actions ("The Law and Rights of Future Generations", Institut des études et de la recherche sur le droit et la justice, April 2023).

The International Event on "Justice, Future Generations and the Environment", will be held in Paris on February 7, 2024 at the premises of the Constitutional Council upon the initiative of the Constitutional Council and the IERDJ. It brings together high-profile judges from all legal systems, from all levels – national, regional and international – and from all orders – judicial, administrative and constitutional courts – to discuss, under Chatham House Rules, the legal aspects of the notion of Future Generations: access to courts, legal basis, and enforceability. Judges will be invited to compare the practices of national and international jurisdictions, discuss common principles, and provide insights into the implications of Future Generations as a legal concept. The conclusions reached could contribute to the discussions leading up to the adoption of the "Declaration on Future Generations" which will be discussed at the Summit of the Future organised by United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres in New York in September 2024.

ACCESS TO JUSTICE FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

The first panel will examine the topic of access to justice of matters relating to Future Generations and the environment, in a comparative perspective. The objective is to evaluate existing legal tools on the following topics:

- The competence of courts to hear claims concerning the interests of Future Generations in environmental cases. This raises the question of the legitimacy of the courts to interpret the interests of Future Generations as justiciable. The panel seeks to identify the competent judge(s), the jurisdiction ratione materiae (constitutional, administrative, civil or criminal jurisdiction), and the jurisdiction ratione loci of national, regional (CJEU, ECHR, IACHR, etc.) and international (ICJ, ICC) courts, depending on the nature of the contentious claims;
- The question of **standing** to bring forth an environmental claim depending on national and supra-national legal traditions. Indeed, the **admissibility** of legal actions initiated by individuals, public entities, associations, NGOs and other organized collectives is disparate across legal systems;
- The articulation of procedures at different levels by national, regional and international judges.

THE ENFORCEABILITY OF THE LEGAL CONCEPT OF FUTURE GENERATIONS

This panel seeks to identify and assess the legal instruments available to enforce legal decisions in environmental matter that engage with the concept of Future generations.

- emergency procedures, such as summary proceedings under ordinary law or specific to environmental litigation, is required as the urgent need for action in environmental and climate litigation must be met by prompt judicial responses;
- specific legal tools to address the interests of Future Generations, such as injunctions, preventive reparation, financial penalties, negotiated criminal justice, the provision of funds, or compliance obligations.;
- mechanisms for monitoring the enforcement of rulings and the coordination of rulings at different levels.
